### Notices of Motion

- 224** The Premier to move—That the House take note of the further answers to Questions on Notice relating to the Commission of Inquiry Scrutiny Committee Hearings provided by Ministers after 9 am on Thursday 7 December 2023. (7 December 2023)
- 225** The Leader of the House to move—That so much of Standing Orders be suspended as would prevent the Supreme Court (Parliamentary Commission of Inquiry) Bill 2023 from being introduced and proceeding through all stages on Tuesday 12 December 2023. (7 December 2023)
- 226** Ms *White* to move—That so much of Standing Orders be suspended as would prevent Notice of Motion No. 227 from being debated forthwith. (7 December 2023)
- 227** Ms *Dow* to move—That the House:—
- (1) Notes the dire statistics released by the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare on 6 December 2023 show:—
    - (a) Tasmania's emergency departments have reached a new level of crisis;
    - (b) ten per cent of Tasmanian patients now spend more than 13 and a half hours in the Emergency Department (ED) – the worst of any jurisdiction and a shocking three hour increase since 2018-19; and
    - (c) for patients who are eventually admitted, the situation is even worse, with 10 per cent spending close to 26 hours in the ED – more than 7 hours longer than the rest of the country.
  - (2) Further notes in the past month we have heard harrowing personal stories from the ambulance ramping inquiry, including patients dying because health services are stretched beyond breaking point.
  - (3) Agrees:—
    - (a) it is clear that after 10 years of the Liberals, emergency care is in crisis; and
    - (b) the Government's plan to cut \$34 million from Tasmania's emergency departments in 2023—the equivalent of more than 300 nurses—is only going to make the situation worse.
  - (4) Calls on the Minister for Health, Hon. Guy Barnett MP to update the House on the progress made on the Emergency Department Review and commit to release publicly the final Action Plan when he receives it on the 15<sup>th</sup> of December 2023. (7 December 2023)
- 230** Ms *White* to move—That so much of Standing Orders be suspended as would prevent Notice of Motion No. 231 from being debated forthwith. (7 December 2023)

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- 231** Ms *White* to move—That the House:—
- (1) Notes the documents tabled by the Treasurer, Hon. Michael Ferguson MP on 15 November 2023 revealed the Minister for Police, Fire and Emergency Management, Hon. Felix Ellis MP released figures for public consultation regarding his “fire levy” which were not developed by Treasury.
  - (2) Further notes the documents contain an email from a senior Treasury official, in which she states that “the composition of rates released by the Minister last week was not sufficient to raise the level of funding required to support the new Fire and Emergency Service... We are not aware who modelled the rates that were eventually released.”
  - (3) Agrees the Minister for Police, Fire and Emergency Management was caught out deliberately providing false information to the public regarding the true impact of his “fire levy”.
  - (4) Further agrees:—
    - (a) this conduct is particularly concerning in the middle of a cost-of-living crisis; and
    - (b) the Minister for Police, Fire and Emergency Management has still not provided a sufficient explanation for his behaviour.
  - (5) Censures the Minister for Police, Fire and Emergency Management, the Hon. Felix Ellis MP, for deliberately misleading Tasmanians. (7 December 2023)
- 232** Ms *Haddad* to move—That the House:—
- (1) Notes:—
    - (a) that in May 2022 the Tasmania Law Reform Institute (TLRI) released its final report and recommendations on law reforms to address the risks and harms caused by sexual orientation and gender identity conversion practices;
    - (b) that the TLRI recognised that conversion practices occur in Tasmania;
    - (c) that the Premier Hon. Jeremy Rockliff MP made a commitment to table a bill to ban conversion practices by the end of 2023 and has failed to do so; and
    - (d) that other Australian states and territories are moving to ban conversion practices.
  - (2) Acknowledges:—
    - (a) that conversion practices are deeply harmful and inflict lifelong trauma and harm to the people subjected to them;
    - (b) that conversion practices are discredited and disproved and are based in pseudo science; and
    - (c) that LGBTIQ+ attributes are not faults or disfunctions, that LGBTIQ+ people are not ‘broken’ or requiring ‘therapy’ or ‘counselling’ to change who they are attracted to or how they express their gender.
  - (3) Further acknowledges that without a legislated ban, Tasmania will be an outlier and could become a ‘safe haven’ for these practices, putting LGBTIQ+ people at increased risk in Tasmania.
  - (4) Calls on the Premier, Hon. Jeremy Rockliff MP to draft legislation immediately to ban these harmful practices from Tasmania. (7 December 2023)
- 233** Mr *Winter* to move—That so much of Standing Orders be suspended as would prevent Notice of Motion No. 234 from being debated forthwith. (7 December 2023)
- 234** Mr *Winter* to move—That:—
- (1) A Select Committee be appointed, with power to send for persons and papers and records to inquire into and report upon:—
    - (a) the process undertaken to approve a \$1.2 million grant for a New Norfolk Distillery;
    - (b) involvement of Members of the Government and their offices in advocacy for the New Norfolk Distillery; and
    - (c) any other matters incidental thereto.
  - (2) The Members to serve on the Committee shall be four, being:—
    - (a) one from the Government, nominated by the Leader of the House;
    - (b) one from the Opposition, nominated by the Leader of the Opposition;

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- (c) one from the Tasmanian Greens, nominated by the Leader of the Tasmanian Greens; and
  - (d) one Independent Member, nominated by the Mover.
- (3) The Committee shall report by 26 March 2024. (7 December 2023)

**235** Mr *Winter* to move—That so much of Standing Orders be suspended as would prevent Notice of Motion No. 236 from being debated forthwith. (7 December 2023)

**236** Mr *Winter* to move—That:—

- (1) A Select Committee be appointed, with power to send for persons and papers and records, to inquire into and report upon:—
  - (a) the involvement and actions of TasRacing, the Office of Racing Integrity and the Minister for Racing, Hon. Felix Ellis MP in the police investigation into the crash of a vehicle towing a horse float at Rowella in January 2023;
  - (b) the circumstances surrounding the removal of Constable Andrew Hansen from the investigation; and
  - (c) any other matters incidental thereto.
- (2) The Members to serve on the Committee shall be four, being:—
  - (a) one from the Government, nominated by the Leader of the House;
  - (b) one from the Opposition, nominated by the Leader of the Opposition;
  - (c) one from the Tasmanian Greens, nominated by the Leader of the Tasmanian Greens; and
  - (d) one Independent Member, nominated by the Mover.
- (3) The Committee shall report by 28 February 2024. (7 December 2023)

**237** Ms *Butler* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes 20,000 people currently live in the Brighton Municipality.
- (2) Further notes Metro do not provide Sunday bus services to Brighton.
- (3) Acknowledges the Brighton Municipality is currently experiencing significant population growth.
- (4) Further notes:—
  - (a) there are not alternative public transport options for the residents of Brighton on Sundays;
  - (b) the exclusion of Brighton from Sunday bus services disadvantages local residents and others wishing to travel to Brighton; and
  - (c) the exclusion of Brighton from Sunday bus services disadvantages young people, older people, people with disability and people who cannot afford to own and run a private vehicle.
- (5) Calls on the Government to provide regular Sunday bus services to Brighton. (7 December 2023)

**238** Ms *Butler* to move—That the House:—

- (1) Notes the invaluable work provided by the 17 community managed Online Access Centres (OAC) across rural/regional Tasmania.
- (2) Further notes after 20 years of operation the Mole Creek OAC will close due to inadequate funding by the Tasmanian State Government.
- (3) Acknowledges:—
  - (a) community managed OACs provide services unique to individual community needs, often meeting gaps in Government services; and
  - (b) OACs provide a diverse range of services such as MyGov ATO, Judicial, Medicare, online banking, setting up new mobile phones, iPad/tablet, set up/sending emails, online shopping, secretarial services, digital literacy, accessing medical services, online passport & visa applications, family violence orders, high quality printing services, email access, physical printing of documents, digital access, digital instruction, digital advocacy.
- (4) Recognises:—
  - (a) community run OACs are reliant on Government funding from the Government's Digital Connections Grant; and

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- (b) current OAC funding arrangements have not increased, are not indexed and are largely inadequate with a number of OACs cutting services; unless current grant funding arrangements are changed, many OACs will be forced to shut.
- (5) Further notes recommendation 34 of the PESRAC Report acknowledges the importance of OACs in closing the digital divide and improving digital inclusion by utilising existing facilities, which provide digital capability.
- (6) Calls on the State Government to appropriately fund and expand the OAC network to improve digital literacy and access to Tasmanian regional and rural communities.
- (7) Further notes OACs provide different services than Libraries Tasmania.
- (8) Further calls on the Government not to amalgamate OACs into Libraries Tasmania. (7 December 2023)

**239** Ms *White* to move—That:—

- (1) The House notes:—
  - (a) the significant public interest in the matters surrounding Justice Geason and the Supreme Court;
  - (b) the importance of upholding the principles of the separation of powers, open justice and equality before the law; and
  - (c) the importance of ensuring the reputation of the courts is upheld.
- (2) The House appoints a Select Committee, with power to send for persons and papers and records, to inquire into and report upon:—
  - (a) the circumstances surrounding the appointment of Justice Geason in 2017, including the management of potential conflicts of interest;
  - (b) whether there was any political interference in Justice Geason’s court appearance on 1 December 2023, including the timing of the hearing and decision to exclude the public and the media from the hearing;
  - (c) any improper attempts to influence the resignation of Justice Geason; and
  - (d) any other matters incidental thereto.
- (3) The Members to serve on the Committee shall be four, being:—
  - (a) one from the Government, nominated by the Leader of the House;
  - (b) one from the Opposition, nominated by the Leader of the Opposition;
  - (c) one from the Tasmanian Greens, nominated by the Leader of the Tasmanian Greens; and
  - (d) one Independent Member, nominated by the Mover.
- (4) The Committee report by 5 March 2024.
- (5) If the House is not sitting when the Committee completes its report, such report may be presented to the Speaker or the Deputy Speaker and in that event, the report shall be deemed to have been presented to the House and ordered to be printed. (12 December 2023)

**14** Covid Management: Adjourned Debate on the Question proposed on Wednesday, 23 November 2022 by Ms *O'Connor*—That the House:—

- (1) Expresses its sincere, heartfelt condolences to family members, friends and colleagues of the 201 Tasmanians who have died with Covid since the start of the pandemic.
- (2) Recognises these Tasmanians were loved and valued members of their families and communities, whose lives were tragically cut short.
- (3) Acknowledges with sadness:—
  - (a) 188 of these preventable deaths have been recorded since 15 December 2021, when Omicron arrived in Tasmania; and
  - (b) the thousands of Tasmanians who suffer from or at risk of disabling, long-term health consequences from Covid infection or reinfection.
- (4) Further recognises the removal of mandated protections, necessary to reduce mass Covid infections, has severely restricted the lives of many vulnerable Tasmanians, including the elderly and clinically vulnerable, and people with disability.
- (5) Accepts the scientific evidence that SARS-Cov 2 is an airborne pathogen with potentially fatal consequences and well understood, debilitating impacts on immune function.
- (6) Notes with real concern stagnating vaccination and booster rates, particularly amongst children and young people.
- (7) Agrees the trajectory of Australian Governments' Covid management, which facilitates constant reinfection, is untenable for individual and population health, as well as social and economic wellbeing.
- (8) Resolves to work cooperatively to educate, promote and model increased vaccination and booster uptake, indoor mask wearing and ventilation.
- (9) Calls on the Government to prevent further disabling illness and loss of life, and urgently adopt evidence-based policies, practices and communications that better protect Tasmanians from Covid. (Next Speaker: Dr *Woodruff*)
